



Message from Sudbury Hospice Foundation Board



Everyone should be able to live and die in peace, with dignity, free of pain, surrounded by loved ones, in the setting of their choice. That is the Vision of the Maison McCulloch Hospice, and it is achieved every day with the efforts of committed and caring staff, volunteers, and with donations from our friends, neighbours and community businesses.

The Ontario government provides funding of 56% of the operational costs of our Hospice. The remaining comes from fundraising efforts and the generosity of the community. People who have needed to access the Hospice do so at no cost as all services are provided free of charge. The Hospice Palliative Care Ontario (HPCO) continues to lobby the government to increase funding, but to date that funding remains limited to 56%.

In a typical year there would have been a variety of fundraising events for our Hospice such as the butterfly release, scotch

taste-testing, a hike and a gala. But of course, these last two years have been anything but typical!

Thankfully, our good friend Gerry had an idea, and the radio Care-a-Thon was born. With the wonderful support of the Pure Country radio station, and the overwhelming support of so many people and businesses, more than \$500,000.00 was raised over the past two years.

The pandemic also saw the introduction of 50/50 tickets as a new fundraising platform. We applied and introduced the 50/50 draw for the Hospice in March 2021 and will continue over the next 10 months. These new events provided the necessary funding so that hospice services continued to be offered at no cost.

Maison McCulloch Hospice is an integral part of our community. It is only with the support of the people of this community that it will be able to continue to achieve its vision.

Letter from the Director / Message de la directrice





I received a call one day and was asked if I would be able to provide a tour to a family that was interested in Hospice care. The family arrived at our hospice and as I greet them at the door, I can see a big smile on their faces as they feel the warmth upon entering. I explain that all staff are exceptionally trained to care for residents at end of life and ensure comfort

I also explain all services that are provided within our Hospice and the family was chocked with how much support options there are. An hour and a half later our tour is complete, and the family takes a walk down by the lake. Prior to leaving they say tearfully "this is such a beautiful place. I can now understand what makes this Hospice so special".

With this being said, throughout all the struggles of surviving during this COVID-19 pandemic our residents have received nothing but the best care that can be provided by such an amazing team of individuals. Together we continue to grow and together we continue to provide the best palliative care to our residents and their families despite the pandemic.

The June Callwood Award was established in 1994 by the Hospice Association of Ontario, now Hospice Palliative Care Ontario, to acknowledge and thank outstanding hospice volunteers throughout Ontario. The award was named in honour of the late June Callwood, the Award Patron, and long time advocate of hospice, community activist, author and recipient of the Order of Canada. June was the inaugural recipient of the award since then, 855 hospice volunteers have been inducted into the Circle of Outstanding Volunteers.

Since the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic, the world has experienced many physiological, sociological and psychological challenges. The Supportive Care and Grief Services program at Maison McCulloch Hospice (MMH) was no exception. As outbreaks worsened and lockdowns began to take place, requests for grief support rose exponentially.

When someone we love dies, moral and emotional support is vital. Support provided by family members, friends and members of our communities were greatly reduced given the efforts taken to flatten the infamous “pandemic curve”. Isolation and social distancing have greatly affected the psycho-social and spiritual well-being of those who grieve. Literally overnight, hugs disappeared and physical presence became separated by a window, plexiglass or 2 meters of distance. Even funerals were put off to a “later date” depriving people from the event’s psychological, social and spiritual values that mark the transition of another life chapter.

Before the pandemic began, most hospice grief support was offered in person. How were we to offer support with these restrictions in place? Offering our services virtually was the only solution, though at the time, the Hospice did not have the required technology. Thanks to Ontario health, the Ontario Trillium Foundation, United Way, other organizations

in our community as well as the in the Sudbury community itself, the MMH is now equipped with technology and staff needed to provide grief support virtually. Since then, individual grief coaching increased from 80 in-person sessions in 2019 to 269 in 2020, an increase of more than 200%.

As we continue to manage life affected by new variants of the Corona virus, we begin once again and with caution, offering in-person one-on-one grief support under certain conditions. That said, virtual grief support is here to stay and has become an added feature to MMH's existing grief program.




